School is well underway and the beautiful fall weather is upon us. It was so nice to see so many of you at our Open House on September 14th. The building was full and the buzz was very positive. Our Drop/Add period has ended and staff and students have settled into the routines of daily academics. All of our teachers have websites which contain their course expectations and contact information. Just a quick reminder – we will be holding parent conferences on Thursday, November 17th and Monday, November 21st. Please sign up with your child's teacher for a convenient time on one of these two dates.

The annual NECAP testing for Juniors will be taking place on the mornings of October 4th, 5th, and 6th. All Juniors are required to participate in this testing. We encourage them to get a good night's sleep and be here promptly in the morning of the testing dates. On the morning of Wednesday, October 12th, all Juniors will also participate in the PSAT testing. Sophomores wishing to take the PSAT test may pay a fee and sign up in the guidance office. *(Please see additional information in the Guidance section of this newsletter.)*

We are pleased to announce that we have six outstanding seniors who have been named as National Merit Scholarship Semi-Finalists. Our congratulations go out to: Maggie Borkowski, Elise Daly, Gregory Partridge, Lauren Pratt, Emily Rowe, and Lauren St. Hilaire. Of the 1.5 million participants, only 16,000 qualified as Semifinalists. We are very proud of our students and the honor they bring to our school! This newsletter is coming to you via the **Alert Now System**. The Alert Now System is used to send notifications to parents via email. This is a **self-managed site which overrides what is entered in PowerSchool**. Parents may log into the system to make changes/add numbers and email addresses for their student(s) by going to sau41.org and clicking on the AlertNow box at the top of the screen. Your user name is the email you supplied to the school and your password is whatever your chose. If you have forgotten your username/password - click "forgot my password". From there you will enter your email address (the one supplied to the school) and should follow the prompts. All students are listed on AlertNow if you have, at minimum, one phone number and/or one email address in PowerSchool. If you choose not to provide an email address to HBHS, you will not receive the AlertNow notifications. We rely on this method of communication to bring you important notices and urge you to check to be sure that your information is accurate and secure.

The Hollis Brookline Rotary Club is looking for HBHS students to study abroad for the next school year (2012-2013). Generally students wishing to participate in this program do so during their Junior year of high school. The application deadline is only three weeks away, so if you're interested, don't delay! There are some requirements, including being in the upper one-third class standing and an age requirement of being fifteen to eighteen and a half as of August 1, 2012. Students must attend school full time. The year abroad will begin about mid-August 2012, and the student's return will be approximately June 2013. Attention parents of 10th and 11th graders. Physicals and updated immunization records may now be due as our policy change is in effect. (Physical Exam/Immunization requirements:

All students entering HBHS will have a complete physical exam every two years, normally in grades 9 and 11. Documentation from the medical provider will be kept in the student's health record. Anyone participating in athletics is required to have proof of physical prior to tryouts)

If you have any questions about your child's physical/immunization exam status please call us. We will be sending alerts soon for those who are not in compliance with the school policy.

Please be mindful of our student population with *anaphylactic allergies to nuts and latex products*. HB is not allergen free but we strive to create a safe environment for all our students.

Parent Education Series

This year we will be focusing on the emotional development of our teens, and the first program in our Parent Education Series, *The Art of Encouragement*, will be presented by renowned speaker, Jack Agati, on **Tuesday, October 4th** at the high school. The program will begin **at 7pm**.

Jack is a dynamic and informative presenter who will address the following: ***How do we encourage a discouraged child?***

This often-asked question must be answered if we hope to bring about long-term changes in another's way of behaving. We need to look upon encouragement as a skill, an art that needs to be understood and practiced to be successful. At the end of this session, the participants will be able to distinguish between praise and encouragement as motivational tools, identify the three (3) techniques that others will use to discourage us from encouraging them, and explore ways to

avoid becoming discouraged in our efforts to encourage others.

PTSA NEWS

We have had a busy couple of weeks. Most of our membership and directory forms have come back and our Membership/Directory chair is hard at work organizing and finalizing. We expect to have directories available by mid-October.

The Parent Education Committee has arranged to have Jack Agati speak on October 4 at HBHS on "The Art of Encouragement." Mr. Agati is a highly regarded speaker and I encourage you to attend this free event.

The most recent Co-op Board meeting was held on September 21, and draft minutes are available after 5 business days by contacting Doris Lindgren at the SAU building (doris.lindgren@sau41.org), which would be September 29. The Co-op Budget Committee's draft minutes will be avail-

able on September 30. Approved minutes are found at the Board's website, found on the left side at <http://sau41.org>. I do urge you to become familiar with the current issues and to voice your opinions, as parents generally are not well represented at the meetings. Probably the most broad-reaching situation right now is the NEASC accreditation, and Ms. Matte's committee has put 8 options before the Board, which have been reduced to 3: Rearranging the scheduling (shorter class times, fewer AP classes); using portables as classroom space (up to 8 classes); and reconfiguring the cafeteria with new rectangular tables. These options will be presented as warrant articles at the Town Meeting in March. After hearing Ms. Matte discuss it at the September PTSA meeting, I would favor the use of portables as it would meet the requirements most completely. NEASC accreditation is an important part of our school's overall reputation for quality; we do not want to lose it.

The next Board meetings will be held on October 19 (Co-op Board) and October 20 (Budget Committee). The SAU Board will meet on September 29 at 6 p.m. in the MPR at HBMS. Although we are all busy, I think we need to make the effort if at all possible and attend these meetings, for the sake of our kids at HBHS, our younger kids coming up, and the quality of life in our towns.

On a different subject, we are still trying to decide what to do, if anything, for a Senior Celebration in June of 2012. If you have any ideas or opinions, please let us know. I can be reached at msshanely@yahoo.com.

Finally, our next PTSA meeting will be held on October 13 at 8:30 a.m. in the mini cafeteria. Please feel free to join us, all are welcome.

From Your Guidance Department

Fall is such a wonderful time of the year and nothing is more beautiful than watching the sun rise over the apple orchards while driving to school. It is such a pleasant way to begin the day. Inside HBHS, autumn is always a very busy time, particularly for the counselors at HBHS. As always, we like to share with you the activities and responsibilities that counselors have in the first few weeks of school.

Prior to the first day of school, counselors review schedules for all 900 students, balance classes and class size, review prerequisites in classes, and double-check senior graduation requirements. Counselors also spend a great deal of time helping freshmen transition in to the school. This year we also welcomed 27 transfer students and 2 foreign exchange students! Counselors participate in 504 meetings, IEP meetings, student/teacher meetings and parent/student meetings. Students visit with their Guidance counselors with concerns that range from peer issues, anxiety, depression, academic issues and all kinds of social/emotional matters. Counselors meet with college admission representatives from more than 70 schools, conduct an evening college presentation for parents/students, and meet in small groups with seniors. Counselors attend College Board workshops to ensure that we are informed of any new procedures and trends. On top of this, we continuously advise students on the college process as well as write the important personal letter of recommendation for each student applying to college. Please know that the Guidance staff tries their very best to meet the needs of all our students and your children. We will schedule meetings as soon as possible and return phone calls and emails in a timely manner. That being said, the above schedule will hopefully allow your insight as to the demands we meet on a daily basis. This year we will be reinforcing a system that promotes appointments (versus a drop-in system) to better manage our time and deliver services to the entire student body. Above all, we will continue to be honest, fair, and an advocate for students during their stay here at HBHS!

Communication — Please remember that in addition to this newsletter essential information is often easily accessible on the website: www.hollisbrookline.org. On the Guidance tab there are various categories so that necessary information can be easily obtained. Also, to assist with current information, reading the daily notices on the main site is often a helpful way for parents to stay abreast of the information your children receive. We look forward to working with you throughout the year!

Senior News

Senior Letters and Credit Checks. Seniors and their families have recently received a letter from their school counselor reviewing their status for graduation. As you are aware, seniors must earn 23 credits to graduate from HBHS. The letter will inform you as to the credits earned to date and those still necessary to complete in order to achieve graduation. Please make sure that you review this information to ensure a happy graduation day in June. Should you have any questions or concerns, please make an appointment with your counselor as soon as possible.

Senior College Night will be held on Thursday, September 22nd at 6:30 pm in the auditorium. We hold this evening presentation to review some of the intricacies of the college application process. It is helpful to have both students and parents attend. There are lots of deadlines, paperwork, applications, recommendations, test submission details and Naviance procedures that need to be reviewed to ensure this process is done correctly. All of this information will be covered during the evening presentation, and subsequently the Power Point demonstration will be placed on the Guidance

HBHS website, along with all of the color-coded paperwork reviewed.

Seniors/Guidance Counselors in Small Group Forums.

On September 23 and 26, the school counselors will be meeting with their Senior students in small group forums. This will allow the counselors to speak to the students in a more detailed fashion. We will review the common application, Naviance procedures, paperwork and answer questions specific to their situations and timelines. Students are encouraged to bring their laptops so we can explore their progress online.

NCAA — Senior athletes interested in participating in college athletics must register with the NCAA. This may be done online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. The NCAA Clearinghouse will require that transcripts be sent from HBHS. Students should advise their counselor of their registration. Students also need to send their SAT or ACT scores to the Clearinghouse. Typically, transcripts are sent twice, one at the end of Junior year and again at the conclusion of Senior year.

College Admissions Visits at HBHS. We have an impressive list of college admission representatives visiting HBHS this year. As we know, college admissions have become increasingly difficult and competitive over time. College interviews can be an important part of this process. Many schools do not offer an individual interview anymore, which makes this person-to-person contact during their visit to HBHS a very valuable opportunity. Please review the list of schools on pages 7 & 8 and check Naviance and Family Connection frequently for continuous updates and additional school visits.

SAT Information—Registration for upcoming tests can be done through the College Board website, www.collegeboard.com. A paper version can be found in the Guidance office should you require this. Deadlines are approaching quickly so be sure to register in time to secure the test location you desire. SATs are not administered at HBHS but rather at Nashua High North and other neighboring high schools

ACT Information — In recent years the ACT has become increasingly popular with New England students. It differs in many respects from the SAT, but primarily it offers a Science component. In addition, some colleges will accept the ACT in lieu of SAT subject tests, which has also enhanced its popularity. The website for the ACT is www.act.org.

SAT Services for Students with Disabilities — A student with a documented disability may be eligible to take PSAT/SAT tests with testing accommodations that support their disability. The student's case manager should be contacted for further details. These accommodations need to be applied for well in advance of the testing date, and the deadline is typically in August for the PSAT and a 7-week minimum advance notice for SAT testing.

Junior News

PSAT—We will once again be offering all our Junior students the PSAT examination. The PSAT will be offered on October 12th. The PSAT serves as a practice test for the SAT and is the qualifying exam for Juniors to participate in the National Merit Scholarship Program. All Juniors will be taking the exam free of charge. Results of the exam will be distributed in early January. Counselors will be meeting with students individually to review the results. This exam is a lead-in to our post-secondary planning with Juniors.

Sophomore News

This year, HBHS will be offering the PSAT to sophomores as a practice exam. There will be a \$15.00 fee for this examination which will be offered on October 12th. Sign-ups are in the guidance office. This is not a mandatory test and although many students may wish to take advantage of this opportunity, other students may feel this is not the time in their academic journey to take it. Both scenarios are perfectly acceptable. We typically order ample exams to cover all students who wish to test. If you have questions as to whether your student is a good candidate to take this exam, please feel free to contact your school counselor.

Freshmen News

Orientation Day—We were very excited about our welcoming day for Freshmen and transfer students. With the help of all our staff and approximately 60 volunteers, new students were able to be greeted with warmth and enthusiasm. HBHS returning students served as guides throughout the day, assisting with lockers and the lunch room. In truth, this day would not be a success without the assistance and energy that our volunteer students give, and we in Guidance remain very appreciative of their help. We hope this day provided a springboard for four years of academic, social and emotional growth.

Classroom Visits — School counselors visited with all of their students on the initial orientation day. We will be visiting students again later this month. Wellness class provides a great forum for us to visit with Freshmen and help them in their transition to the high school. Our 9th grade students are welcome to come to Guidance and make an appointment – please encourage them to do so!

Career Services News

Internships, Work Study, and Job Shadow — Internships and work study are well underway for first semester. Internships are a great way for Seniors and Juniors to explore career interests while earning credit towards graduation. Parents, if you think your workplace may be able to provide a career exploration opportunity in the form of an internship, work study, or job shadow, please feel free to contact me for additional information. Students interested in taking advantage of this opportunity in the spring should make an appointment with Mrs. Sullivan in the Guidance office to begin the process.

BAE SYSTEMS- Women in Manufacturing — “Women in Manufacturing” is an inside look at careers in advanced manufacturing for Seniors and Juniors in high school. Students will participate in a weekly afterschool job shadow in the Nashua facility, where they will build mechanical assembly kits, do some simple soldering, take part in a factory-simulation exercise, tour production floors, and discuss career paths with female operations managers and former student interns. Interested students should see Mrs. Sullivan in Guidance.

Military Reminder — All high schools are required by law to provide the branches of the U.S. Armed Forces a list of all current junior and senior students, including home address and phone number. If you do not want your son's or daughter's name provided to the military recruiters, you must complete the disclaimer on the school's website and return it to the guidance office by Friday, September 30, 2011. The disclaimer will be effective for your child's entire career at HBHS.

Selective Service Registration.

The Selective Service System is an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. The mission of the Selective Service System is to provide the number of men needed by the Armed Forces, within the time required, should Congress and the President decide to return to a draft, in the event of a national emergency. Registration is the process of providing the Selective Service with name, address, phone number, and other related information about one's self. It is a civic and legal responsibility for every young man to register with the Selective Service within the time period starting 30 days before, and ending 30 days after, their 18th birthday. Register online at www.sss.gov or pick up a registration card at any post office.

In accordance with Federal law and US Dept of Agriculture policy, this institution is prohibited from discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability.
