## ► **Some Thoughts from the Principal**

Late winter is a busy time here at Hollis Brookline High School. We are finishing up the winter sports season, district meeting and budgets are the topic of conversation and we are beginning the process of course selection for the 2007-2008 school year.

The Hollis Brookline Coop District meeting is scheduled for the evening of March 7<sup>th</sup> and March 8<sup>th</sup> (if necessary) at 7:00pm in our gymnasium. The budget will be presented for your approval as well as a number of warrant articles. In building our budget we worked very hard to balance the need to provide the best education for your children while allocating funds as efficiently as possible. There are two warrant articles for some of the critical needs we have here at the high school. The portable classroom warrant addresses the shortage of classroom space we are experiencing this year and addresses the anticipated increase in enrollment next year. There is also an article that addresses our desire to incorporate computer technology into our classrooms. The increase in instructional time has taken its toll on the current computer resources, which includes laptop carts and labs. We are proposing to add an additional laptop cart and to upgrade in other areas.

This year we increased the amount of time for semester exams from 90 minutes to two hours as well as placed the exam grade on the report card. Initial reports from the faculty indicate an improvement in the quality of student work on the semester assessments that they attribute to these changes.

The Program of Studies has arrived from the printer and we are beginning the process of course selection. A copy of the Program of Studies has been posted on the school website with course selection timelines and forms. For those of you with children entering from grade 8, we will have a Course Selection information night at 7pm on March 27<sup>th</sup>, following which the counselors will visit the grade 8 students at the Middle School and assist them through the process.

In last month's newsletter it was indicated that we will institute a process of on-line course selection this year. We hope that this will allow us to collect data more efficiently and allow us to make decisions on resource allocation and develop a master schedule in a timely fashion. It is important that all students have a signed Computer Usage Agreement on file which will allow them to have an account on our computer network.

Cavalier spirit was on display at two recent events, the January 25<sup>th</sup> talent show, with the notable performance of a staff dance medley at the conclusion of the evening and at the second annual Mr. HBHS held on the evening of February 1<sup>st</sup>. Students are busy planning for the annual Pep Rally which will be held on Friday February 23<sup>rd</sup> and preparing for the annual spring musical, *Working*, which is scheduled for March 22 – 24. The winter sports season is winding down with many of our teams participating in their respective playoff

tournaments. Congratulations to our Girl's Swim team for placing second in the State Tournament, to Sarah Jacoby our one person gymnastics team and state champion in the bars and to our hockey team for their successful inaugural season. The winter season will conclude with the annual Sports Awards night on March 29<sup>th</sup> and the third week of March will find our spring athletes trying out for their respective teams. Our National Honor Society has been accelerating their fundraising efforts to place a granite sign at the entrance of our track honoring Coach Lou Korcoulis. On Super Bowl Sunday 16 staff members took part in the annual Penguin Plunge into the Atlantic Ocean held at Hampton Beach. The Cavaliers finished second in fundraising in the state and brought in over \$9,800 of the total \$350,000 raised for Special Olympics of New Hampshire. Our team was overwhelmed by the generosity shown by both of our communities.

Our US FIRST team has been very busy preparing their robot for this year's competition. Students and advisors have been here most nights and weekends since the beginning of winter working long and hard preparing their robot for competition. Their robot had its debut on February 13<sup>th</sup> at Nashua High School North and will compete on March 1-3 at the Verizon Center in Manchester. Senior Dara Fisher has been invited to be a candidate for the 2007 Presidential Scholars Program. Dara is one of 2600 students chosen from nearly 2.8 million graduating high school seniors. In the spring, 141 of these students will be named Presidential Scholars. This is one of the highest honors our nation's high school students may receive. Dara has also been selected as an Al Neuharth Free Spirit Scholarship winner. She is one of 102 top journalism students carefully chosen to represent all 50 states; she will receive a \$1000 scholarship and will attend a conference in Washington, D.C. in March. Allison Huberlie was selected as one of 250 high school seniors nation-wide to receive the 2007 Coca-Cola Scholarship Award. She is guaranteed a \$10,000 scholarship, will attend a Scholars Weekend in Atlanta Georgia and will interview with the National Selection Committee where 50 students will be named for the \$20,000 Scholarship Award. Finally, earlier we announced five students as semifinalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program, Christopher Berling, Trevor Buteau, Dara Fisher, Suzi Grossman, and Katherine Lumbard. We are now very pleased to announce that all five of these students have been named as finalists in the 2007 competition for Merit Scholarship Awards.

One of the benefits of compiling this monthly newsletter is that it provides an opportunity for all to share in the accomplishments of our students and staff. The drawback is that there may be individuals or groups that are not highlighted. What is mentioned here is just a small portion of the daily accomplishments of our talented students and staff. This becomes evident at an event such as the talent show or in just talking to our students about their dreams; many who are successful academically are also spending countless hours developing their talents beyond the classroom. We are very proud of all of our students and what they add to our school community.

## Note from the Director

It has been a very busy January and February for the Guidance office. As noted in the last newsletter in early January we met individually with students to discuss PSAT scores and have continued to explain testing to students who are interested. With the distribution of report cards in late January counselors have been meeting with students, teachers and parents to ensure students are heading in the right direction for second semester. In that same light the counselors sent home letters to all seniors regarding graduation requirements. We feel this communication with seniors and their parents is very important as seniors move toward graduation. If there are any questions or concerns please be sure to contact the counselor. We have been busy sending out midterm grades to colleges so that students' college applications are complete, in this mailing alone we sent out over 700 transcripts. It was a massive undertaking that Mrs. Noel, Mrs. Graff and the counselors were involved in. We are happy to say they are all out and are waiting anxiously to hear of colleges' decisions. We are in the midst of planning our information night for juniors and their parents along with rewriting the college admission handbook. It is hard to believe it is already time for the juniors to receive this information and start the admission process! Along with the notion of time flying; registration for 2007-2008 will begin in March and more information will be coming in future Newsletters. The guidance office is always a busy place and this winter is proving no different!

We are happy to have a new member to our staff for the spring semester; Jennifer Catherine. Ms. Catherine is a graduate student in the Counseling Education program at Keene State College, and will be interning with us until June. Ms. Catherine has experience working with troubled teens and middle school counseling. Jenn is a wonderful addition to our staff.

## 2007 – 2008 Course Registration

The Program of Studies will be heading to the printer's soon and will be available the week after vacation. Counselors will be going in to classes to discuss the program of study for each class and the options students have. The registration process will continue through March 16th when all students must have their registration forms back to guidance. This year we have made the process of course selection electronic and students will be able to do this process from home. Mr. Boucher and Mr. Raymond have worked tirelessly making this available to students. We are very excited about this new venture.

## Advanced Placement Testing

Advanced Placement Testing will be offered starting the second week in May. In the next few weeks counselors will be going to all the Advanced Placement classes to discuss the tests and the registration process. Information will be placed on the website as well.



## Information Sessions and Tours

We are delighted that so many families find Hollis Brookline High School an option for their children and we are happy to answer any questions new members to our community have regarding the options at the high school, however, due to the overwhelming amount of requests to talk with a counselor and tour the school, the Guidance department has tried to come up with a logical solution that will service the community. We are offering two time slots during the week for Information Sessions and Tours. The times and days are Mondays at 7:45 – 8:30 am. and Fridays at 12:30 – 1:15 pm. ## Communication

## Senior News

In early February counselors sent home graduation letters. This letter is to inform students and parents what students need to complete graduation requirements. The counselors feel it is very important for students to know where they stand in regards to graduation. It is important that any senior who is either missing credit or in need of adding a course required for graduation sees their counselor immediately. Seniors will be receiving another letter after third quarter alerting them as to whether or not they can graduate. *If you are missing a graduation requirement or you are in danger of failing a required course it is vitally important for you to see your counselor immediately.*

## Receipts for Information Sent

When information has been sent to a college each student will receive a receipt stating what was sent to a college and the date it was mailed. Students should stop by the Guidance Office to pick up their receipts so that they know exactly what was sent to colleges and when. Please keep these for your records. Receipts can be picked up in the Guidance Office but will only be given to the student if they have paid the \$3.00 per school postage fee. Report cards and Progress reports will be held if these fees are not paid.



## College Admissions

Admission decisions will be coming out periodically but there will be many colleges notifying students at the end of March. Congratulations to all students receiving acceptances to colleges. We ask that students please share with their counselors where they have been accepted and where they have not. This helps the counselors work with juniors as they start their college process. Please let us know where you plan to attend. This helps us prepare for the end of the year report and forwarding final transcripts to colleges. We love hearing good news and about students' successes.

## Midterm Reports

During the first week of February all midterm grades were sent to the colleges. Any school where a student told us they applied received a midterm report. Remember: no midterm exam grades were sent to colleges.

## Accepted Student Open Houses

Colleges will be hosting Accepted Student days on their campus' in the spring. This is a great time to see the college through the lens of an accepted student not a potential admission candidate. These days often help students make that final decision. If the college does not host such an event make some time to see the campus again to get a clear idea about your choice. Colleges welcome potential students to visit classes and experience the life of a student on their campus. Be sure to take advantage of this opportunity.

## Financial Aid Information

Financial aid deadlines are approaching fast. Be sure to get financial aid information in as soon as possible. Any delay in this process can disadvantage a family from receiving aid. If you have concerns regarding Financial Aid at this time, an appointment with college financial aid offices is a good way to learn about that particular college's financial aid opportunities. All colleges require the FAFSA form from families that are considering financial aid. To fill out the FAFSA on-line, use the government website [www.FAFSA.gov](http://www.FAFSA.gov). Again, for most college the FAFSA must be submitted by March 1, 2007. Financial Aid materials are available in both Guidance and the library at HBHS. Please check the Guidance website for more scholarship and Financial Aid information. Don't self-select yourself out of the Financial Aid process. You never know unless you apply!!

Some private colleges will require the CSS PROFILE. The PROFILE is only for private colleges and only certain schools use this form. It can only be submitted electronically and can be accessed through the College Board website at [www.collegeboard.com](http://www.collegeboard.com). The PROFILE can be submitted at any time but should be submitted before March 15<sup>th</sup>.

Another great source of information is the NH Higher Education Assistance Foundation (NHHEAF) in Concord. NHHEAF can be reached by e-mail [www.nhheaf.org](http://www.nhheaf.org) or calling 1-800-525-2577. Financial Aid materials are available in both Guidance and the library at HBHS. Please check the Guidance website for more

scholarship and Financial Aid information as well as the PowerPoint presentation from our Financial Aid Night held in December.

Don't self-select yourself out of the Financial Aid process. You never know unless you apply!!

## Scholarships

A list of scholarships is located on the website and is updated every Friday. Applications are available in Guidance.

## Scholarship Requests

If your son or daughter is applying for a scholarship and needs supporting documentation, there is a "Scholarship Transcript Request Form" in Guidance. Students can indicate which information they would like to be sent (transcript, recommendations, SAT/ACT scores, and school profile). Please indicate if you will be sending your scholarship application or if you would like us to mail it out with our information. Letters of recommendation will not be given directly to students. There is \$1.00 processing/mailing fee for each scholarship request.

## NCAA

Senior Athletes interested in participating on athletic teams in college must register with the NCAA. This may be done online at [www.ncaaclearinghouse.net](http://www.ncaaclearinghouse.net). The NCAA Clearinghouse will require that transcript be sent through the mail. Guidance is happy to send the transcript to the Clearinghouse if you provide us with the NCAA forms (downloaded from the website) that need to accompany the transcripts. One form must be sent when you submit your initial eligibility form and another must accompany your final transcript when you graduate. If these forms are not submitted to NCAA it will delay the athlete's ability to compete at the collegiate level so it is important to get these to Guidance as soon as possible.

## Junior News

Counselors have been meeting with juniors to discuss their PSAT test results and their credit check for graduation. Students have received copies of their transcripts and credit checks so they can look ahead to senior year as they think of the appropriate courses for senior year. Any junior who has not met with their counselor to discuss and receive PSAT scores and graduation requirements should make an appointment to see their counselor as soon as possible.

It is now the juniors turn to get into the college admission frenzy. Counselors are already busy meeting with juniors and their parents discussing options and colleges to visit. With two vacations on the horizon it may be helpful to start scheduling college visits. All appointments to visit college campuses can be made through the admission office of the college. By notifying the admission office families can be assured a tour and an interview if they so choose. February and April vacations are perfect times to visit college campuses.

## Junior College Information Night

On February 22<sup>nd</sup> from 7pm – 8:30pm the Guidance Department will host an information night for juniors and their parents. This evening is designed to help families start the admission process. There will be a lot of information available to parents and students. Topics discussed will be; what colleges are looking for, how to start the process, essay writing and SAT testing. All families in attendance will receive an updated College Admission Handbook. *Students are strongly encouraged to attend this event with their parents.*

## College Admission Handbook

The College Admission Handbook is being updated as this newsletter reaches your homes however our current handbook is on the website under college information if you wish to start early and see what this process entails. This handbook is a wonderful source of information and has all the forms needed to get through the maze of paperwork students face their senior year. Be sure to get a hard copy or look at the online version.

## SAT Information

SAT Reasoning Tests and SAT Subject Tests: Registration for upcoming tests is ongoing through the College Board website. If students are having trouble accessing their account through the College Board please stop by Guidance to pick up a paper copy of the registration information. Deadlines are approaching quickly so be sure to attend to them.

Registration for tests on: March 10<sup>th</sup> – deadline February 2<sup>nd</sup> (No Subject Tests are administered in March)

May 5<sup>th</sup> - deadline March 29<sup>th</sup>

June 2<sup>nd</sup> – deadline April 27<sup>th</sup>

SAT's are not administered at HBHS but are available at Milford Nashua, Souhegan and other local schools. Specific locations are online or in the registration booklet in Guidance.

It is important to plan testing around busy sports and activity schedules in the spring. Check with coaches and club advisors as to what weekend dates games, meets and activities may be scheduled.

Colleges like to see a junior SAT and a senior SAT score and will take the highest scores of each section. Students should plan to take the SAT's at least twice during the college admission process. Student can also take the ACT. Colleges look at the ACT and the SAT interchangeably so there is no disadvantage to taking either or both. Some students find they do better on the ACT than the SAT so it is worth investigating or asking your counselor about this test. Registration and general ACT information can be found on [www.ACT.org](http://www.ACT.org)

SAT Subject Tests are required by a small percentage of school but always by more competitive colleges. Students may want to think about taking these tests at the end of the year of the year they finish the class (i.e.: Accelerated Biology or Precalculus students may want to take the SAT in biology or math at the end of 9<sup>th</sup>/10<sup>th</sup> grade).

## Destination College

The New Hampshire Higher Education Assistance Foundation (NHHEAF) is sponsoring its annual statewide college convention for high school juniors and their parents. This free event will be held at Plymouth State University on Saturday March 17<sup>th</sup> from 8am to 2:30 pm. Pre-registration is required and can be done online at [www.destinationcollege.org](http://www.destinationcollege.org). Reservations must be received by March 9<sup>th</sup>. This is a great program that offers a variety of workshops for students and parents, motivational speakers, mini college fair and an opportunity to enter a scholarship raffle.

## Sophomore News

As with the junior PSAT takers counselors have been meeting with any sophomore student who participated in the fall testing if any student who took the test has not received their scores please see your counselor as soon as possible. It is important for accelerated students to consider taking the SAT Subject tests at the end of their sophomore year. Please see the section on SAT testing in this newsletter.

## Freshman News

As with the 10<sup>th</sup> grade students counselors will be going over the academic requirements for graduation as we start to head into the registration season (early March). The meetings are designed to help students plan what they want and need to do to graduate and get the most out of their high school education. Students should sign up for appointments with their counselor to review this information.

## ► Special Education News

The New Hampshire Department of Education (NHDOE) periodically conducts a Special Education Program Approval Visit to all New Hampshire school districts and the one for SAU #41 will be on March 21-22, 2007. The process involves a review of the present status of programs and services made available to children and youth with educational disabilities. As part of the NHDOE Special Education Program Approval Visit, Case Study Compliance Reviews will be conducted at all of the schools in SAU 41. These include: Richard M. Maghakian Memorial School, Captain Samuel Douglass Academy, Hollis Primary School, Hollis Upper Elementary School, Hollis Brookline Middle School, and Hollis Brookline High School.

The Case Study Compliance Review involves teams of general and special educators, parents, students, administrators and school board members working together to assess the work of the school and review related outcomes for students with educational disabilities. Activities related to this NHDOE Case Study Compliance Visit include the review of specific case studies, verification of personnel credentials for special education staff, program descriptions and SPEDIS verification reports and analysis of data collected during the visit. Throughout the entire review process, the visiting team works in collaboration with the staff of SAU #41.

Evidence of the work conducted in-district and results related to student outcomes will be gathered throughout the process, guided by the materials and templates provided by the NHDOE, Bureau of Special Education. Examples of evidence include student individual education plans (IEPs), progress reports, samples of student work, grades, extracurricular involvement, permanent records, and access to the general curriculum, etc. Input is gathered from key constituents, including interviews with professional staff, parents, paraprofessionals, administrators, and in some cases, the students. In addition, classroom observations will be conducted for each of the case studies being reviewed.

## ► Selective Service Registration

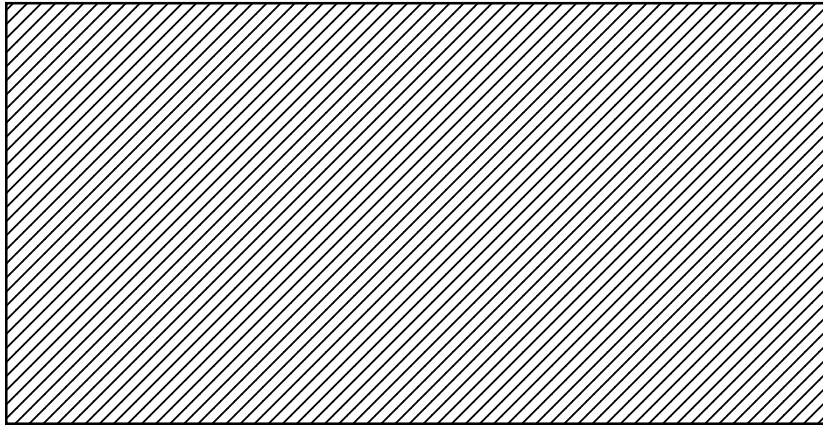
The Selective Service System is an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. The mission of the Selective Service System is to provide the number of men needed by the Armed Forces, within the time required, should Congress and the President decide to return to a draft, in the event of a national emergency. Registration is the process of providing the Selective Service with name, address, phone number, and other related information about one's self. It is a civic and legal responsibility for every young man to register with the Selective Service within the time period starting 30 days before, and ending 30 days after, their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday.
