



Some Thoughts from the Principal

As many of you already know, our school community suffered a great loss with the passing of Coach Lou Korcoulis on March 4th. **Coach has been part of our school for the past 44 years as a teacher and coach of boy's and girl's cross country as well as boy's and girl's winter and spring track. He touched the lives of generations within our community and was an integral part of what makes this school what it is. We will miss him greatly but we are all better people for having had him be a part our lives.**

By the time you receive this newsletter we will have already held our Winter Sports Awards night, on March 23rd, which happens to be Coach's birthday. We are looking forward to again hosting the Class I Track Meet on May 27th, which will give us another opportunity to honor our Coach.

April marks the time when many of our seniors will be receiving notification of acceptances from colleges. Our seniors are being reminded of the importance of a strong finish to their high school academic career. Colleges look carefully at their third and fourth quarter grades as an indicator of the type of student they have accepted. Course selection for grades 8 through 11 is now in full swing. We are asking students to pick at least 6 and at most 7 credits of classes for next year. Please read the Program of Studies carefully as there have been some changes this year. Guidance counselors have been visiting classes since mid March. We ask that students fill out their course selections carefully with alternatives so that we may allocate the available resources most efficiently. The school web site contains most of the scheduling information (<http://www.hbhs.k12.nh.us/Course%20Selections.htm>) including, a copy of the Program of Studies, course selection forms, deadlines and updates. For those with children in grade 8, we have scheduled a course informational night on March 27th in the auditorium. Plans are in the works to follow up in May with an evening open house for Grade 8 students and their families, where we will offer student led tours, as well as information on academics, athletics and clubs.

At the Coop District Meeting, which was held March 9th and 13th, voters approved the teacher contract and the addition of a School Resource Officer. A bond article increasing cafeteria capacity, classrooms and parking did not receive the necessary two thirds vote and the operating budget was reduced by 1%. With or without the bond article we still need to address the parking situation on campus. Plans are in the works to require parking stickers for staff, juniors and seniors. We will distribute passes to staff and seniors first to ensure that there is still space for the juniors. We can no longer provide parking spaces for sophomores on school grounds there is simply not enough spaces available. There will be no charge for the pass this spring and we will charge \$25 per semester beginning next year for

juniors and seniors. As mentioned in last month's newsletter, there is discussion of tying the parking passes to academic performance, similar to the senior options program (2.0 GPA and no failing grades or serious discipline issues for previous quarter). This is something that if put into place would not happen until second semester next year so as to give students fair notice. We hope to make the baseball field parking areas available to those who do not have a parking pass.

As the weather turns towards spring, thoughts move towards graduation and related activities. Soon you will be receiving a letter from the S-Team for Youth Committee of the PTSA requesting your financial support for the Post Graduation Cruise. This chaperoned evening provides a wonderful, substance free and safe environment in which our graduating seniors can enjoy their last formal time with fellow classmates. We encourage you all to take a moment and donate, if you can.

It is at these meetings that the citizens of Hollis and Brookline can voice their opinion and participate in the governance of our Co-Op School District. We thank you for playing a part in determining the future of our children's education and educational environment. Continued parental involvement is critical in providing our children the best education possible.

The PTSA cannot function without the dedication of parent volunteers. Whether you volunteer in the Computer Lab, Library, with Sport Teams, in the Classroom, go on Field Trips, or with the Plays, we send out t heartfelt THANK YOU. 2005-2006 SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE IN GUIDANCE

Community Christmas Card Scholarship

- Eligible student is any Hollis area resident who has been accepted to an approved program of his or her choice and is enrolled as a full-time student. Primary consideration will be given to those entering full-time vocational/technical programs. Applications in guidance.
- Amount: Varies.
- Deadline: May 19, 2006.

Delsignore Educational Scholarship

- Eligible students are HBHS senior students interested in pursuing a career in education or related fields. Applicants will be judged primarily on academics, school/community involvement and the essay. Minor emphasis on informal interview and financial need.
- Amount: \$500 or \$1,000.
- Deadline: May 5, 2006. Return application, essay, and transcript to guidance.

Jim Sands Memorial Marine Educational Scholarship

- Eligible students are high school seniors and college undergraduates currently studying in one of several marine sciences. Info at www.underwatereducation.org
- Award: Funds can be used to become SCUBA certified, advance SCUBA certification, or for academic expenses related to field of study.
- Deadline: May 1, 2006.

Lavalee/Brensinger's Art Scholarship Award

- Eligible students are high school seniors considering a career in the arts, architecture, or interior design. Applications can be found at www.lbpa.com.
- Award: \$1500
- Deadline: March 31, 2006. Application and one piece of artwork needed.

LEAP Scholarship

- Awarded based on financial need and merit. Applications in guidance.
- Award: \$2,500
- Deadline: March 24th 5:00 p.m. (info received).

Longpine Hunter Club Scholarship in Memory of George C. Paro

- Eligible recipients must be a senior at HBHS accepted by a college, university, or institution of higher learning for the Fall semester, a HBHS resident currently attending college, university, or institution of higher learning, or a son/daughter of members of the Lone Pine Hunters Club. You must have a GPA of C or better and must be currently pursuing or planning to pursue a degree in the nature sciences (environmental, forestry/wildlife, biology, etc.).
- Amount: \$1000
- Deadline: May 26, 2006. Applications in guidance.

Moran Family Scholarship

- New Hampshire Land Surveyors Foundation is offering this scholarship to NH high school seniors. First priority is financial need, with a strong likelihood the person would become a surveyor at the end of the program as a second priority.
- Amount: \$1,000
- Deadline: March 31, 2006.

New Hampshire Association of Broadcasters

- Applicants should be enrolling full-time at an accredited two or four-year college or university and enrolling in a career of over-the-air broadcasting. Applications in guidance or at www.nhab.org
- Award: \$2,250
- Deadline: April 7, 2006 by 5 pm.

New Hampshire Charitable Foundation Statewide Student Aid

- Applicants are pursuing a four-year or graduate degree program. Download your applications at www.nhcf.org or pick up a copy in guidance. There is a \$20 processing fee and fee waivers are available through NHCF.
- Awards: Range from \$500 to \$2,500. Average award \$1800.
- Deadline: April 21, 2006 (to be received).



New Hampshire School Custodian Association Charles P. Lamie Sr. Scholarship Award

- Applicants must be NH residents, graduating seniors who plan to attend a NH based post-secondary Technical, Vocational type school in the fall. They must be maintaining at least a 2.0 GPA. Essay and application available in guidance. Good citizenship is an important part of this scholarship.
- Award: \$1,000
- Deadline: April 14, 2006.

New Hampshire Society of Professional Engineers State Scholarship

- Eligible students are high school seniors or undergraduate students who are currently, or will be enrolled in an Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET) accredited engineering program. Applicants must be in-state (NH) and preference will be given to students planning on attending a NH university/college. Eligibility criteria and applications available online at www.nhspe.org.
- Award: \$1,000
- Deadline: April 1, 2006.

New Hampshire Water Pollution Control Association Student Scholarship

- Scholarship for NH resident seniors who are applying to a post secondary school with an intended major in Water Pollution Control, Environmental Science, Engineering, or Chemistry. Priority given to vocational students who are preparing for a field directly related to water environment. Application in guidance.
- Award: \$1,000
- Deadline: March 30, 2006 (post-mark).

Nick Jennings Memorial Scholarship

- In honor of Nick Jennings. This scholarship will not necessarily be awarded to the candidate with outstanding scholastic achievements, but to a student that most exemplifies Nick's athletic involvement, artistic abilities, and his overall personality. Awarded to a high school senior who is a resident of Hollis or Brookline, has been accepted to an institution of higher learning, and has been involved in athletics and/or the theatrical or musical arts. On Thursday, we suspended classes and sent four bus loads of students to the funeral services in Manchester. Those in attendance learned lessons on how one lives a dignified life of service to family and to their community. Coach would have been proud of his Cavaliers.

Selective Service Registration

The Selective Service System is an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. The mission of the Selective Service System is to provide the number of men needed by the Armed Forces, within the time required, should Congress and the President decide to return to a draft, in the event of a national emergency. Registration is the process of providing the Selective Service with name, address, phone number, and other related information about one's self. It is a civic and legal responsibility for every young man to register with the Selective Service within the time period starting 30 days before, and ending 30 days after, their 18th birthday. Guidance Counselors are meeting with students in their English classes to explain the registration process but to also discuss students' transcripts, graduation requirements, the new schedule, and appropriate courses. Students in the 11th and 10th grades received registration information the week of March 13th and will return their signed forms to guidance on March 17th and 20th respectively. The 9th grade students will receive the same information March 20th and 21st and must have forms returned to Guidance by Friday of that week. Counselors are happy to discuss the registration process with parents and students through e-mail or a phone conversation so do not hesitate if there is a question.

We appreciate your patience while we have been short staffed but hope to be in full swing by Monday, March 20th. We are pleased to share that Mrs. Gangemi had a baby girl, Chloe, on February 21st. Mom and baby are doing great! We have more news regarding Mrs. Kozlowski who will be departing for a medical leave on Friday March 17th. Mrs. Kozlowski is expecting twin boys in late spring. We are thrilled that our Guidance family is growing and wish Mrs. Kozlowski all the best but realize this may cause some anxiety among students. Our information night for juniors and their parents was very well attended and we appreciate any feedback you may have on the evening as well as the college admission handbook that was distributed. We encourage juniors and parents to make appointments to meet with their counselor to continue the college admission conversation.

This is also the time of year when many seniors receive college admission decisions and contemplating graduation. While this may be an exciting time it can be overwhelming as well. Please be aware that senior students may be experiencing some very deep and confusing feelings and may appear quite distant. There are so many feelings surrounding the college decision and pending graduation. Because of this, it is important for parents and

students to have as much patience and understanding as possible. If you have any concerns or questions call the colleges but also contact the Guidance Office and we will try to help in any way we can.

2006 - 2007 Course Registration

The Program of Studies is on-line and being distributed in classes throughout the next two weeks. Counselors will be going into classes to discuss the program of study for each class and the options students have. The registration process will continue through March 24th which is the last day registration forms are due in Guidance. It is important for students to take this process very seriously. If they are late returning the forms they are not guaranteed placement in desired courses. The master schedule is built on student requests. If we do not have the forms returned in a timely fashion we cannot build an accurate master schedule. This is a lengthy and time consuming process and with your help it will ensure that students will have few conflicts and the appropriate offerings available to them.

11th grade forms due to Guidance by March 17th

10th grade forms due to Guidance by March 20th

9th grade forms due to Guidance by March 24th

We appreciate your assistance in this process.

Advanced Placement Testing

Advanced Placement Testing will be offered starting the first week in May. The week of March 20th counselors will be going to all the Advanced Placement classes to discuss the tests and the registration process. Information will be placed on the Guidance website as well. All registration forms are due to Guidance by the 31st.

Senior News

In the next week a letter from Mr. Kelley will be sent home to senior students who may be in danger of not graduating. This letter is to inform students and parents what students need to do to complete graduation requirements. The letter encourages the student or parent to contact the teacher of the class(es) in question in order to get on the right track for graduation. Seniors will be receiving another letter after third quarter alerting them as to whether or not they can graduate. *If students are missing a graduation requirement or are in danger of failing a required course it is vitally important that they see their counselor immediately.*

Receipts for Information Sent

When transcripts and recommendations are sent to colleges students receive a receipt stating what was sent and the date it was mailed. Students should stop by the Guidance Office to pick up their receipts so that they know exactly what was sent and when. Please keep these for your records. Receipts will only be given if the \$2.00 per school postage fee has been paid. Senior students with outstanding fees *will not* receive their third quarter report card on April 14th.

College Admissions

Admission decisions will be out notifying students by the end of March. Congratulations to all students receiving acceptances to colleges. Please share with your counselor where you have been accepted and where you have not. This helps counselors work with juniors as they start their college process. Also, please let us know where you plan to attend. This helps us prepare for the end of the year report and forwarding final transcripts to colleges.

Colleges will be hosting Accepted Student days on their campus' in early April. This is a great time to see the college through the lens of an accepted student, not a potential admission candidate and often help students make their final decision. If the college does not host such an event, make some time to see the campus again on your own to help make the final decision.

The national date for submitting a non-refundable tuition deposit to your selected college is May 1st. This is a non-negotiable deadline for most colleges and universities. If you miss this deadline without contacting the college it may jeopardize your acceptance. To ensure your spot in the class, send a written confirmation and the required deposit to one college. Seniors should inform colleges they do not plan on attending by either e-mail or a phone call so that these colleges may offer admission to other students that may be on their waitlist. This does not hurt colleges' feelings but helps them offer other students an opportunity.

Many schools use a wait list in the admission decision process. If you are placed on the wait list by your first-choice college, be sure to deposit at your second choice school as there is no guarantee the college will take students from the wait list. In fact, in recent years colleges have been using the waitlist less and less.

Financial Aid Information

Financial aid awards will either accompany acceptance letters or will be sent shortly thereafter. The award letters usually contain a cost breakdown that itemizes expenses such as tuition, fees, room and board, books supplies and personal expenses; the Expected Family contribution (EFC), which is calculated based on the Free Application for Federal Financial Student Aid (FAFSA) and the amount of aid the school is offering, which is based on the difference between your total EFC and the cost of attending the college.

The award letter will include a deadline for accepting the college's offer of financial aid. Missing this deadline could mean losing a grant, scholarship, employment opportunity or loan assistance. Colleges typically will not negotiate (and get very uncomfortable) their financial aid awards based on other colleges' offers.

If you have concerns regarding Financial Aid it is a good idea to make an appointment with college financial aid offices to discuss your situation. Colleges strongly encourage families with questions to contact them. It is important to find out how an outside scholarship may affect your aid award. Will the college reduce it from a loan or grant? If the financial aid award seems to have overlooked special circumstances affecting your family be sure to meet with them to discuss the situation. The financial aid office is as important as the admission office in helping to make a good decision about where to attend school. Please check the Guidance website for more scholarship and Financial Aid information.

Another great source of information is the NH Higher Education Assistance Foundation (NHHEAF) in Concord. NHHEAF can be reached by e-mail www.nhheaf.org or calling 1-800-525-2577. NHHEAF is also a great source for scholarship and financial aid information.

Local scholarships are coming into the Guidance Office daily. Please stop by often to see what is available. Some scholarships actually go unawarded because students do not fill out the applications.

NCAA

Senior Athletes interested in participating on athletic teams in college must register with the NCAA Clearinghouse. This may be done online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. The NCAA Clearinghouse will require that transcript be sent through the mail. Guidance is happy to send the transcript to the Clearinghouse if you provide us with the NCAA forms (downloaded from the website) that need to accompany the transcripts. One form must be sent when you submit your initial eligibility form and another must accompany your final transcript when you graduate. If these forms are not submitted to NCAA it will delay the athlete's ability to compete at the collegiate level so it is important to get these to Guidance as soon as possible.

Junior News

Now is the time for juniors to start the college admission process. Counselors are already busy meeting with juniors and their parents discussing options and colleges to visit. In early April counselors will be going into junior classrooms to discuss the admission process. April vacation will be upon us before we know it so it may be helpful to start scheduling college visits. All appointments to visit college campuses can be made through the admission office of the college. By notifying the admission office, families can be assured a tour and an interview if they so choose. April vacation is a perfect time to visit college campuses. If you can't make it to campuses during April vacation plan to do some visits to local colleges after school. Many admission offices are offering tours until 4 pm daily.

College Admission Handbook

A very comprehensive handbook explaining aspects of college admission was distributed at the Information Night on February 23rd. If you were unable to attend but would still like a book please stop by the Guidance Office to pick up a copy. We have one copy available per family. The handbook allows students and parents the opportunity to learn more about what colleges are looking for, college entrance exams, essay writing, interviews, college visits, NCAA guidelines and financial aid and more. We strongly encourage junior students to have a handbook.

SAT Information

SAT Reasoning Tests and SAT Subject Tests: Registration for upcoming tests is ongoing through the College Board website. If students are having trouble accessing their account through the College Board please stop by Guidance to pick up a paper copy of the registration information. Deadlines are approaching quickly so be sure to attend to them:

May 6th test – registration deadline April 3rd

June 3rd test – registration deadline April 28th

No Subject Tests are administered in April but they are available in May and June.

SAT's are not administered at HBHS but are available at Nashua, Souhegan and other local schools. Specific locations are online (www.collegboard.com) and in the registration booklet in Guidance. It is important to plan testing around busy sports and activity schedules in the spring. Check with coaches and club advisors regarding weekend dates for scheduled games, meets and activities.

Colleges like to see a junior SAT and a senior SAT score and will take the highest scores of each section. Students should plan to take the SAT's at least twice during the college admission process.

SAT Prep courses are offered here at Hollis Brookline High School and at other agencies. Please see your counselor for more information.

ACT

The ACT is another college entrance exam accepted by all colleges and universities. These tests are not offered as often as the SAT tests but will be offered two times in the upcoming months at Alvirne High School.

June 10th test – registration deadline May 5th

College Fairs

We are fortunate that this spring there are a number of large college fairs to assist students in meeting college representatives and obtaining information. The National Association for College Admission Counseling will be hosting a college fair on April 11th from 6-9 pm at the Bayside Expo Center in Boston. Over 400 colleges from all over the country will participate. This is a very big fair and very busy so plan on staying for the entire time just to get around to all the colleges. The other fair that students and parents are encouraged to attend is the Southern New Hampshire Spring College Fair held at Pinkerton Academy. The date of this fair is April 13th at 6 pm. Parking is at a premium at Pinkerton so it is best to get to the fair prior to 6 pm. New England Association for College Admission Counseling college fair will be held at Keene State College on Friday May 12th from 9–1:30 am. This fair will host 250 colleges from mostly New England but from other areas as well. The list of attendees for all these fairs can be found in Guidance.

It is a good idea to bring a bag of some sort to carry college brochures and printed mailing labels to put on cards that college representatives will ask students to fill out. This is a great opportunity to explore several colleges at once site.

ASVAB

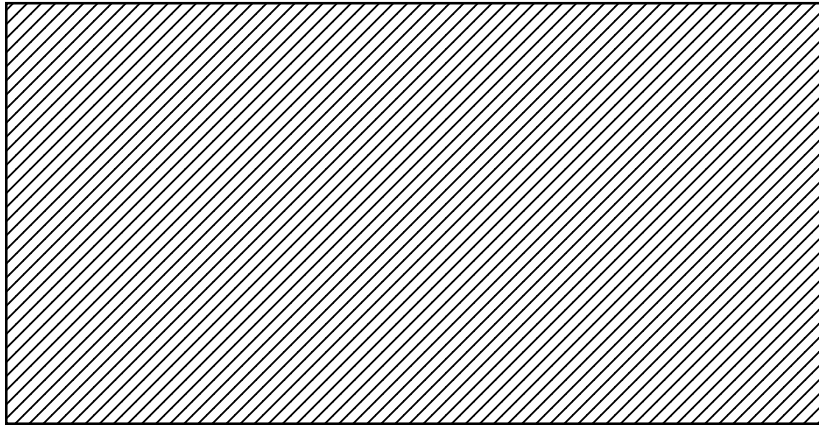
