Guidance News

Note from the Director

As the autumn months approach we are busy with many activities in our lives; new academic challenges, fall sports and activities, seasonal events and the start of the college admission process. This is a time of many transitions and it is no different at HBHS. With schedule adjustments behind us, the counseling staff has now moved on to other important proceedings. During the end of September and the beginning of October the counselors will be focusing on visiting with the 10th and 11th grade students to talk about the PSAT test, meeting with the 9th grade students in small groups to get to know our students and discuss what Guidance at the high school level is all about. However, the bulk of the counselors time will be spent meeting with seniors as they prepare for the college application process.

Although many people love the autumn because of the beautiful weather and change of season, for seniors in high school this is probably one of the most stressful times in their lives. When expectations are set high for a great last year of high school, seniors will often say the fall of their senior year was a blur of pressured activities surrounding the anxious process of applying to college. Senior year is not always what it is expected to be. Some students start to get senioritis, may start to separate from friends and family as they start to move toward the end of their high school careers and just realize the finality of the high school experience. Be gentle with your son or daughter and yourselves at this time. Emotions are running high and can often lead to a break in communication. Now is not the time for families to experience a communication breakdown. Working through the college process and senior year successfully depends on thoughtful and well discussed decisions. At times students will not always do what they are suppose to do in a timely fashion, they will at times appear disinterested and unmotivated about looking at and applying to colleges, they may disagree with your ideas about what you think is important in a college or career. Do not despair! This is not uncommon behavior when a big decision or the unknown is looming. Some students would prefer to magically wake up on September 1, 2007 in a dorm room somewhere. As unrealistic as this notion is it would be far easier if there was not so much thought and anxiety that goes into the activities of senior year and future planning. We are here to help. The counselors are well informed regarding the admission process and we can sometimes help out in motivating a student to get going. We have a wonderful new career counselor to help students so please feel free to contact us at any time regarding your son/daughter and we will be happy to help.

Although this is a busy time for all students and families, always feel free to contact your daughter's or son's guidance counselor at any time if you have any questions or concerns. Our 9th grade students are going through a huge transition as well and will often feel a little shy about coming to guidance with a question – encourage them to do so!

As always, thank you for all your patience and support. I hope you find this information helpful as we move through October.

COUNSELOR'S CASE LOADS

We are trying to make it easier for students and parents to know what counselor is assigned to what student. This year we are breaking up the freshman class by alphabet and will continue to do this with each new 9th grade class so that the counselors will be working with the same portion of the alphabet. The national standards in school counseling provided by the American School Counselors Association suggest this method of breaking up the alphabet is the most fair and efficient way to divide counselor case loads.

CAREER SERVICES

We are happy to announce the start of our new Career Counselor Mrs. Sandy Demarest. Mrs. Demarest comes to us from Merrimack High School where she was instrumental in starting an internship program among other career related opportunities for students. We are very excited to have her with us in the guidance office working with students on career exploration, job searches, job shadowing and internships.

Senior News

Counselors are continually meeting with seniors to discuss college plans but any senior who has not met with his or her counselor is encouraged to set up a meeting as soon as possible. Parents are always welcome to come with their senior or to call and arrange a meeting.

College Information Night

Our College Information Night for seniors and their parents will be held *September 27, 2006* in the HBHS auditorium from 7- 8:30 p.m. All students and parents are strongly encouraged to attend as we will be going over admission policies and logistical information regarding the application process such as: recommendations, how transcripts are sent, timeline and deadline dates.

College Applications

Timing for college applications is very important. If you have not already done so, it is time to get going! Although many applications are not due until January or February, some must be submitted sooner. Check the colleges' websites or written information for deadlines. Students considering Early Decision or Early Action should be filling out their applications now, if you have any questions regarding these early programs please call or e-mail the counselor. *Be aware UNH has changed the deadline date for Early Action from December 1st to November 15th.*

Please note: the Guidance Office needs 4 working weeks to process all the materials to be sent to colleges. It is therefore very important students let their counselors know where they are applying and the deadline dates as soon as possible.

There are a lot of forms connected to applying to college. HBHS and the colleges require certain forms. The most obvious is the application but there are other procedures that must be followed to ensure the information gets to a college in a timely and complete manner.

1. The guidance office requires students to fill out a *Transcript Request* form.

This form is to let the counselor know where the student is applying and when. A \$3.00 per college fee should be attached to this form. This fee covers the processing and postage of the admission packet.

2. We also request that students fill out a *Recommendation Request* form for the teachers they are asking to write recommendations and for their counselor. These can be downloaded from the website or picked up in the guidance office. Please remember to bring the fee, it can be a check made out to HBHS or cash.

Most colleges have an on-line process of applying for admission; in fact colleges *prefer* that students apply electronically. Many colleges also accept the Common Application that can be downloaded from the website www.commonapp.org. Please be aware that colleges often have supplemental forms either with their own on-line applications or attached to the common application that need to be submitted to make the application complete.

Within the Common Application is a School Report, Mid-Term Report and two Teacher Recommendation forms. These forms must be brought to the counselor and the teachers in order for the applications' supporting materials to be complete. Again, 4 weeks notice is required to ensure that all these documents are filled out, collected and sent in time.

College Admission has become increasingly more difficult and competitive therefore colleges rely more on a student's total presentation in the application process. This means that students should be very careful in filling out applications, in writing their essay and deciding who they would like recommendations from. Colleges are very concerned that these recommendations are confidential in nature. This means that the student has not reviewed the recommendation of either a teacher or a counselor. Guidance will be responsible for putting together a packet to be sent to the student's colleges that includes: official transcript, school profile, teacher(s) and counselor recommendations. The student is responsible for sending in the application, application fee and having the official SAT scores sent to the college directly from the College Board.

Interviews

Interviews are a very important part of the admission process. If you have not scheduled visits please do as soon as possible. It will help with your decision making. Keep in mind that colleges are very busy this time of year and need at least a 2 – 4 week reservation for an interview. Many colleges have weekend Open House programs at this time of year. These are a great way for students and parents to get a complete overview of the college. Watch for these notices in the mail, through college web-sites and on the bulletin board outside of the Guidance Office.

Financial Aid Information

Financial Aid Night will be held in early December. A date and time will be posted soon. If you have concerns regarding Financial Aid at this time an appointment with college financial aid offices when visiting is a good way to learn about that particular college's financial aid opportunities. Another great source of information is the NH Higher Education Assistance Foundation (NHHEAF) in Concord. NHHEAF can be reached by e-mail www.nhheaf.org or calling 1-800-525-2577. Financial Aid materials are available in both Guidance and the library at HBHS. Please check the Guidance website for more scholarship and Financial Aid information.

All colleges require the FAFSA form from families that are considering financial aid. The paper form of the FAFSA will be available at our Financial Aid night. Families are encouraged to fill out the FAFSA on-line which can be accessed through www.FAFSA.gov.org. The FAFSA can not be submitted before January 1, 2007. Some private colleges will require the CSS PROFILE. The PROFILE is only for private colleges and only certain schools use this form. It can only be submitted electronically and can be accessed through the College Board website at www.collegeboard.com. The PROFILE can be submitted at any time. Colleges have very strict deadlines for Financial Aid applications so it is important to adhere to the deadlines.

Scholarships

Throughout the school year, opportunities for scholarships become available. Interested students should *check the website, watch the notices and check regularly with Guidance for information*. The bulk of scholarships arrive during the second semester with local scholarship opportunities becoming available in February and March. A few, including some highly competitive national scholarships have fall deadlines therefore interested students should check with the guidance office during October and November. Seniors interested in ROTC scholarships should begin the application process in early fall.

SAT Information

SAT Reasoning Tests and SAT Subject Tests: Registration for upcoming tests is ongoing through the College Board website. If students are having trouble accessing their account through the College Board please stop by Guidance to pick up a paper copy of the registration information. Deadlines are approaching quickly so be sure to attend to them. November 4th test – deadline September 29th, late registration is October 11th. December 2nd test – deadline November 1st. SAT's are not administered for at HBHS but are available at Nashua, Souhegan and other local schools. Specific locations are online or in the registration booklet in Guidance.

Colleges Visiting HBHS

College Representatives visiting HBHS will be starting in late September and going through the middle of November. Most representatives will be visiting on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. This is a great opportunity to meet with representatives from various colleges to learn more about the schools or ask additional questions. Seniors, juniors and parents are all welcome to come. Students can obtain a pass from Mrs. Noel but must have an o.k. from their teacher and are responsible for missed work. *Please check the website for the listing of colleges that are visiting the HBHS guidance office.*

NCAA

Senior Athletes interested in participating on athletic teams in college must register with the NCAA. This may be done online at www.ncaaclearinghouse.net. The NCAA Clearinghouse will require that transcript be sent through the mail. Guidance is happy to send the transcript to the Clearinghouse if you provide us with the NCAA forms (downloaded from the website) that need to accompany the transcripts. One form must be sent when you submit your initial eligibility form and another must accompany your final transcript when you graduate. If these forms are not submitted to NCAA it will delay the athlete's ability to compete at the collegiate level so it is important to get these to Guidance as soon as possible.

College Fairs

UNH and Southern New Hampshire University is hosting the annual NEACAC college fairs on their campuses. The UNH fair is September 28th from 7-9pm. Southern New Hampshire University in Manchester will host the fair on October 3rd from 7 -9pm. Over

250 colleges from all over the country will be in attendance. College fairs are a great way for students to obtain information about post-secondary opportunities. Not only is this a good time for seniors and their parents but for juniors and their parents as well.

Other Senior News

Although every senior received a letter from their counselor at the beginning of September regarding graduation requirements, it is important that any senior who is either missing credit or in need of adding a course required for graduation sees their counselor immediately.

Junior News

Counselors will be meeting with groups of juniors to discuss preparation for the upcoming PSAT and SAT testing programs.

PSAT

We are very excited to be offering all our junior students the opportunity to take the PSAT. The PSAT will be administered to ALL JUNIORS at HBHS on Wednesday October 18th. The PSAT serves as a practice test for the SAT and as the qualifying tests for juniors to participate in the National Merit Scholarship Program. All juniors are will be taking the test free of charge. Interested sophomores can also take advantage of this testing opportunity but will be charged \$13.00 and must pay in advance. Sign up for those sophomores interested in taking the PSAT will take place in the Guidance Office from September 18th through October 10th.

Students will receive upon sign-up a test preparation booklet with information regarding the test and practice tests. On the day of the test students will be assigned to a testing room and need to bring two sharpened # 2 pencils and a calculator.

The PSAT is only offered on two dates annually, this year it is Wednesday October 18th and Saturday October 21st. If your son/daughter will not be in school for the 18th he/she will have to take the test at a local school on that Saturday. Nashua and Alvirne offer Saturday tests. Please call the guidance offices at those schools to get more information. The PSAT is a practice SAT and a very helpful tool for test taking in the future. Results of the PSAT usual come out in late early January. Counselors will meet with students individually in early January to go over results and how to use the test as a stepping stone to the SAT.

SAT SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

A student with a documented disability may be eligible to take PSAT/SAT tests with testing accommodations that support their disability. The student's case manager should be contacted for details as soon as possible.

Sophomore News

Sophomore students are welcome to take the PSAT. This is designed as a junior level test so it is recommended that students taking the PSAT should at least be enrolled in Geometry. If a student is in a lower level math he/she may struggle with the questions in the math portion of the exam. This may cause the student to become discouraged or anxious about the SAT. Sophomores do not qualify for the National Merit contest and will be required to take the PSAT again during their junior year.

The HOBY scholarship information will be available around the first of October.

Freshman News

Counselors will be visiting 9th grade classes during the first two weeks of October. We are looking forward to meeting all the students.

SAT Preparatory Courses

HBHS offers two SAT Preparatory courses during the school year. The fall course is a 7-week course offered to Seniors to prepare them for the November SAT 1. The spring course is an 8-week course offered to Juniors to prepare them for the May SAT 1. The cost of the course is \$250 and covers materials, instructors' fees and a complete SAT exam that is scored. More information, including registration forms and schedules, can be found on the school website.

Selective Service Registration

The Selective Service System is an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. The mission of the Selective Service System is to provide the number of men needed by the Armed Forces, within the time required, should Congress and the President decide to return to a draft, in the event of a national emergency. Registration is the process of providing the Selective Service with name, address, phone number, and other related information about one's self. It is a civic and legal responsibility for every young man to register with the Selective Service within the time period starting 30 days before, and ending 30 days after, their 18th birthday. Register on-line at www.sss.gov or pick up a registration card at any post office. If you have any questions, please see Mr. Winslow in Guidance.

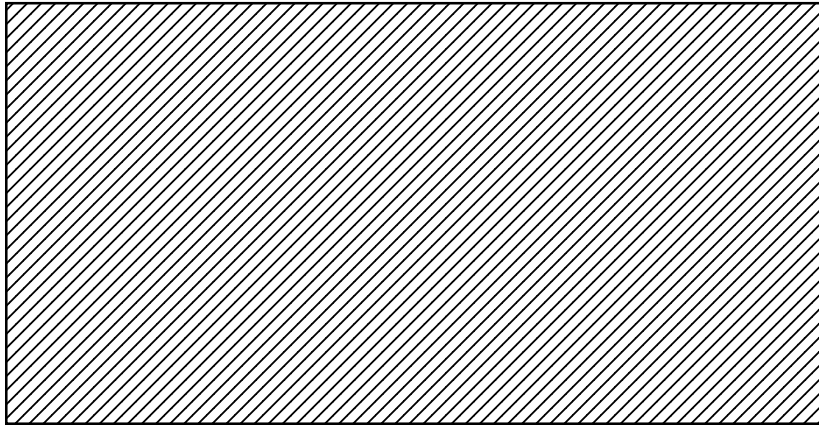
